A CIVIC CELEBRATION

LEXINGTON IS THE PLACE TO BE ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND



On Monday, May 27th, the community is invited to celebrate the culmination of Lexington's 9 month celebration in honor of the town's 300th Anniversary. Like the formal Opening Ceremony, held last September, the 300th Anniversary Concert will include a wide array of Lexington leaders, volunteers and community organizations. This event's central theme for entertainment revolves around music.

Kenny Laxague returns to the 300th Team to play the role of Radio Announcer on the fictitious radio station W-L-E-X. Last seen in the 300th production *Breeches, Bloomers and Bellbottoms: Oh My!*, Laxague was happy to be asked to take on a new role in the upcoming concert. "Kenny was such a pleasure to work with, and very funny!" notes Jessie Steigerwald, who worked with Laxague in the autumn musical revue.

Organizers are thrilled that Laxague will bring his comedic style to the Memorial Day event. Susan Navia, producer of the 300th Anniversary Concert, adds, "this event will integrate the formal close of town-sponsored 300th events and pass the torch to community organizations who want to plan their own events through next March; Kenny will be sure to keep our spirits light on this occasion."

Pomp and Circumstance

The 300th Anniversary Committee will recognize some of the individuals and teams who have helped make the major events

There will also be a special tribute to town staff. "Without the extra dedication of every department across town, the celebration would not have been possible," observes Polly Kienle, 300th Anniversary Committee member. She continued, "as volunteers, we relied on the professional staff from virtually every department, including: Public Facilities, Public Works, Police, Fire, Recreation, Schools, Engineering, Health. In addition, the Town Manager's office and Town Clerk's office provided tremendous support."

An Old-Fashioned Radio Show

Audience members will be entertained by the radio show format selected for the evening. At fictitious station W-L-E-X, the lead announcer will guide the audience through an evening of music specially selected in honor of the town's Anniversary. Visiting performers include the Lexington Bicentennial Band, the Master Singers of Lexington, The Lexington Pops Chorus and the Lexington Symphony.

Two works will be world premieres, including *Seeds of Revolution* by Daniel Lutz. Lutz was commissioned by the Bicentennial Band to create a work that would celebrate Donald Gillespie's contributions to the town throughout his years as founder and conductor of the Bicentennial Band. The piece, *Seeds Of Revolution*, will be played as a world premiere at the Anniversary Concert. Eric Michelson will be par-

ticipating - not as a musician- but as a reader. Jeff Leonard, conductor observed that Michelson is perfect for the role. Leonard says the band has enjoyed learning the piece and it will remain in the Band's repertoire throughout the summer.



The Lexington Symphony will perform composer John Tarrh's "Symphony No. 2, Freedom" -- which was commissioned by Lexington Symphony and written in commemoration of the town of Lexington's 300th anniversary -- on Monday, May 27, 2013 (Memorial Day), as part of the town's 300th Anniversary Concert.



Residents can expect an extraordinary event on Saturday May 25th, bringing two very special tributes together, the clock and time capsule. Current and former members of the Board of Selectmen are all being

invited as special dignitaries. The excitement begins after Discovery Day with an After Hours Concert beginning at 3:30 p.m. at Emery Park. The Lexington Retailers Association is sponsoring the band *The* Nowheremen, a

Beatles cover band, and everyone is invited to join in the fun. Participants can get into the spirit of the event by wearing their favorite 300th clothing, or clothing with a 1960s theme.



At 4:00 p.m. the official ceremony will begin and planners have made sure that it will be fun for all ages. A brief patriotic sing-along will include *You're Grand Old Flag* with a special verse for the event (*You're a Grand Old Clock*). Expect brief remarks and fun surprises. The event will take place rain or shine and, like the Bell Ringing, is a oncein-a-lifetime free community event.

300TH OLD TIME BASEBALL
Lexington's 300th Anniversary TEAM Spirit

Over the last year, Lexington residents and staff have pulled together as one to celebrate the town's 300th Anniversary in creative ways. "On deck" is a complete Lexington line-up for Old-Time Baseball on Sunday, May 26th at Center Field.

Free events at Old-Time Baseball begin at 11:30 with an Opening Ceremony. As the official 300th historic trading card states: back in the 1930s, Lexington Sunday afternoon baseball games drew crowds of 2,000. Event organizers Colleen Smith, Allyson Huntington, and Betsy Wilkinson hope to reach that number. Visitors are encouraged to bring blankets and lawn chairs.

At noon, Dick Berardino throws out the first pitch. Dick has been with the Boston Red Sox organization for 43 years. In addition to baseball, the day will be filled with entertainment including: a flyover by a WWII antique plane; a stilt walker; a cappella singing; an 1860s dance group; contests; and kidfriendly activities.

Team rosters have been announced and fans will see plenty of familiar faces to cheer on. "Lexington's Finest" is comprised of members of the Police Department and Lexington Firefighters. Team Managers Sal Mirabella and Rick DeAngelis have been planning since last fall. Mirabella observed that it is very special to be on a joint Fire-Police team.

Police Chief Mark Corr says: "I jumped at the opportunity to Wildcat plane. The plane is being participate in this 300th Anniversary event – everyone loves sponsored, in part, by the Collings baseball. In a way I am also making up for hiding during the [300th] talent and fashion shows." Corr continues, "I will enjoy playing with other Lexington Police and Fire Department personnel." He looks forward to "playing before and sharing some laughs with a rowdy Lexington audience." Sue Rockwell, 300th Committee Chair, notes that she expects having police on the field will keep the peace very nicely!

The "Lexington Baseball" team includes dedicated citizens who serve as coaches or directors for Lexington Little League. "What a great Lexington moment this will be," says Lexington Softball coach Liz O'Neil. O'Neil, Director of Community Nursery School, sees this unique event as a way for coaches to demonstrate their passions for the game and the town: "We are all looking forward to our participation in this wonderful community event -- a chance for all of us to run the bases!"

"Every home team needs someone to play against and the organizers of the Essex Base Ball Club have been exceptionally wonderful," observes Colleen Smith. History buffs will be thrilled that the games

> will follow rules from the late 1800s: all pitching will be underhand; no gloves will be allowed.

"Bringing Old-Time Baseball back to Lexington helps us celebrate the town's history and honor the important role baseball has had in Massachusetts' history," notes Polly Kienle, public historian and member of the 300th Committee. Uniforms were inspired by an 1887 photograph of a Lexington Baseball Team. Smith has re-created the "L" logo to tie the present celebration to our town's traditions.

The event is free to the community, thanks to sponsorships from Cambridge Savings Bank and many other generous donors who have contributed all year. The bank helped fund the uniforms, stilt walker, and inflatables. Souvenirs are available for donations to the 300th Committee and help further defray the

expenses.



On Saturday, May 25th, the community is invited to gather to look to the past and the future. The 300th Anniversary Clock will be unveiled – and the 300th Anniversary Time Capsules will be dedicated to Lexington as we look forward to the town's 350th Anniversary in 2063.

A Clock to Honor 300 Years

The Lexington Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Lexington have collaborated to give a lasting gift to the town – a permanent monument to Lexington's 300th Anniversary. Nothing could be a better gift to mark the passage of time over the last three centuries than a monumental timekeeper. To that end, the Lions and Rotary Clubs agreed to fund the purchase and installation of a clock of significance, the 300th Anniversary Clock.

The Clock was manufactured by the East Bay Clock Company of Gulf Bay Florida. It was

completed and began the journey to Lexington at the end of April. Eric Carlson, member of the 300th Anniversary Committee, was the point person between the Historic District Commission and the Clock Company. It took many steps to achieve agreement on the precise location and the final






